## OVERVIEW OF CERTIFICATE EXAMINATION AT THE C2 LEVEL OF LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE COMMON EUROPEAN FRAMEWORK OF REFERENCE FOR LANGUAGES: LEARNING, TEACHING, ASSESSMENT (CEFR)

Students who pass the Examination in Language Proficiency at C2 level will be awarded a University of Warsaw Certificate. Such a certificate verifies the student's very high level of proficiency and an ability to use the language effortlessly and effectively in all social, academic and work contexts, enabling academic and occupational mobility.

The Certificate exam is made up of two parts: a written test and an oral test. Students must attain $60 \%$ on the written test prior to taking the oral test.

In order to obtain a Certificate in Language Proficiency students need to attain $60 \%$ on both the written test and the oral test. The final mark awarded will be the sum of the marks attained for both the written and oral parts of the exam.

The total score is converted, on the basis of a recognised conversion table, to an academic grade according to the grading system adopted by the University.
